The Latest Version of the National Broadband Map is Now Publicly Available

You may view the map, which shows where broadband service is and is not available, at <u>broadbandmap.gov</u>. This most recent version of the map includes new information – specifically, refined location and internet availability data.

On this version of the map, released November 17, 2023, there are over 25,000 more Broadband Serviceable Locations identified in Tribal areas than the previous version, and over 70,000 more Broadband Serviceable Locations than the first pre-production draft of the map. The map also shows more refined availability data in Tribal communities due to resolved challenges, the FCC's verification and audit efforts, and our continued work with providers as they refine their data matching and reporting.

The National Broadband Map is an evolving data collection and has been providing more precise internet availability data with each update. While we have made significant improvements in the identification of Broadband Serviceable Location data in Tribal areas, we encourage you to review the map for your community. If you identify any remaining locations that are missing or misidentified, or availability data which you believe is inaccurate, you may submit a challenge to help improve the data.

FEMA and CISA Tribal Cybersecurity Grant Program Deadline January 10, 2024

The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) and the Cybersecurity and Infrastructure Security Agency (CISA) opened the application process for a new grant program to

help tribes shore up their defenses against cyber-attacks.

Eligible applicants can apply for a grant to fund new or existing cybersecurity programs. The grant can be used for a variety of activities, including establishing critical governance frameworks, identifying key vulnerabilities, implementing mitigation measures, and developing a 21st-century cyber workforce.

Deadline to apply for the grant is January 10, 2024.



Second Round of Tribal Broadband Connectivity Program (TBCP) Funding Deadline is January 23, 2024

This second round of funding from the Tribal Broadband Connectivity Program will make approximately \$980 million available on Native American, Alaska Native and Native Hawaiian lands for deployment of Internet infrastructure, affordability programs, telehealth and distance learning initiatives. Read the Program Overview <u>here</u>. Visit <u>grants.gov</u> to apply. Applications for the TBCP must be received no later than 11:59 p.m. Eastern Time (ET) on January 23, 2024.

More states are releasing their Initial Proposals to the Broadband Equity, Access and Deployment (BEAD) program as well as 5-year action plans. Tribal leaders are encouraged to participate in the development of these Initial Proposals by ensuring their communities are served. The Federal Communications Commission's **Affordable Connectivity Program** (ACP) provides a discount of up to \$30 per month toward Internet service for eligible households and up to \$75 per month for households on qualifying Tribal Lands. Visit <u>GetInternet.Gov</u> to sign-up.

Round 2 Resources

For Round 1 Awardees, this December marks the close of the eRA/GEMS extended reporting deadline, for both Performance Progress Reports and Federal Financial Reports (SF-425). These reports, normally due October 30th, must be submitted by December 31st, via the eRA/GEMS platform, and should cover all activity from April 1 to September 30th. It is imperative you check to ensure you have access to eRA/GEMS and that all previous team member assignments and roles are correct. OBAE Announces Grant Writing, Engineering, and Planning Grant (GWEP)

The Office of Broadband Access and Expansion (OBAE) is pleased to announce the Grant Writing, Engineering, and Planning (GWEP) Grant, aimed at

providing crucial financial assistance to Tribal governments and local governmental units. This grant is designed to support the procurement of grant writing, engineering, and planning services. These services will aid in identifying community broadband needs and facilitate the application process for various funding sources dedicated to broadband-related projects.

Who Can Apply? Tribal governments and local governmental units, including federal government entities, state governments, local/municipal governments, and public or municipal organizations that are government-owned and operated, as well as units of a state university system, are eligible to apply for the GWEP Grant.

Please note: Rulemaking is currently underway to extend this opportunity to rural telephone cooperatives and rural electric cooperatives. Further announcements will be made once these entities become eligible.

Funding Details: The maximum grant award is \$100,000. Grant funds are limited, and the application process will remain open until all funds are obligated. Matching funds are not required, making this an accessible funding opportunity for eligible applicants.

Apply for the Tribal Libraries Pilot Program

USAC and the FCC are now accepting applications to participate in the Tribal Libraries Pilot Program.

To <u>apply</u> for the Tribal Libraries Pilot Program, libraries must complete a brief questionnaire detailing information about your library, your IT needs, and your readiness to participate in the E-Rate program.

Please note that participating in the Tribal Libraries Pilot Program will provide your library with training and support to apply for E-Rate funding. Your library will still have to complete the E-Rate application process.

Based on last year's Pilot Program, libraries that were most successful in applying for E-Rate funding had support and participation from Tribal leadership, library leadership, and IT leadership. We encourage interested libraries to engage those groups when applying for the Tribal Libraries Pilot Program.
