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2024 New Mexico Tribal Broadband Convening

The February 28th Convening at Inn of the Mountain Gods was a valuable opportunity for stakeholders to meet and receive updates on pertinent technical, legislative, and funding on broadband. Attendees included Tribal Leaders, personnel from IT, Broadband, and Education sectors, fostering a collaborative environment conducive to addressing key issues impacting tribal communities.

The convening is part of a multi-year effort to support internet for all in rural New Mexico and for tribal members in New Mexico on behalf of the New Mexico Office of Broadband Access and Expansion (OBAE) and the Connect New Mexico Council.

Grant Writing, Engineering, and Planning (GWEP) Grant Open Application

The Office of Broadband Access and Expansion (OBAE) will award financial assistance grants to aid Tribal governments and local governmental units in procuring grant writing, engineering, and/or planning assistance to help identify community broadband needs and to support applying for other funding sources for broadband-related projects.

Requirements:

- · Open application until funds are obligated
- No matching funds required
- Max award is \$100K
- Tribes are NOT required to provide a BTIN or TIN (see info and instructions below).

Nations, Tribes, and Pueblos (NTPs) are not required to provide a TIN. Agreements with NTPs usually occur via an Intergovernmental Grant Agreement, which does not have the same requirements as a contractor for instance.

In the application, look for the section: New Mexico Business Tax Identification Number (BTIN): For Tribal submissions this will remain "0" as this is not required.

OBAE Connect NM Fund Grant Applications Extended to March 18 Open Office Hours March 15

The Office of Broadband Access and Expansion has extended the deadline for Connect New Mexico Fund grant applications. Eligible projects include Last-Mile Networks, Middle-Mile Projects, 5G Wireless Networks, and Special Network Projects. Please keep in mind that fiber projects for unserved and

underserved locations will be prioritized. The minimum award amount for eligible entities is \$250,000 with a maximum of \$6,000,000.

Second Round of Tribal Broadband Connectivity Program (TBCP) Funding Deadline Extended to March 22

NTIA is extending the original submission deadlines! The deadline extensions are

intended to provide potential applicants with more time to develop competitive project proposals and project consortia. Eligible Entities that previously submitted applications may submit revised applications (entire application must be resubmitted) on or before the new submission deadline.

This second round of funding from the Tribal Broadband Connectivity Program will make approximately \$980 million available on Native American, Alaska Native and Native Hawaiian lands for deployment of Internet infrastructure, affordability programs, telehealth and distance learning initiatives. Read the Program Overview here. Visit grants.gov to apply. Applications for the TBCP must be received no later than 11:59 p.m. Eastern Time (ET) on March 22, 2024.

MATI and Mescalero Apache Tribe Drive Ultra-Fast Connectivity to Remote Tribal Communities

Mescalero Apache Telecom, Inc. (MATI) is harnessing its fiber access solution to bring high-speed connectivity to rural tribal communities in New Mexico. Supported by a mix of loans and grant funds, MATI's new infrastructure is the first full FTTH XGS-PON network to be built among any tribal nation. Part of the

Broadband Infrastructure Deployment initiative, the solution will deliver symmetrical Gigabit services to the Mescalero Apache reservation. The deployment is set to have a significant impact on the community, empowering residents with access to critical online resources such as education, telehealth services and remote work opportunities.

It is critically important to correct any data that may be inaccurate indicating internet coverage as portrayed within the maps for funding to be spent in an effective manner to achieve meaningful broadband access for those who need it most, including the unserved and underserved in New Mexico.

Please note the following important challenge dates:

March 25 - April 5, 2024: Connect New Mexico Fund Challenges

To review the maps and learn more about the challenge process, go to the Connect NM mapping and data webpage.

The National Broadband Map is an evolving data collection and has been providing more precise internet availability data with each update. While we have made significant improvements in the identification of Broadband Serviceable Location data in Tribal areas, we encourage you to review the map for your community. If you identify any remaining locations that are missing or misidentified, or availability data which you believe is inaccurate, you may submit a challenge to help improve the data.
