Broadband Technical Assistance Funding Opportunity Deadline June 20, 2023

The newly announced Broadband Technical Assistance (BTA) Funding Opportunity Announcement (FOA) has been published

in the Federal Register. The \$20 million available for BTA is made possible by funding the USDA Rural Utilities Service (RUS) received in the <u>Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act</u> (IIJA) (Pub. L. 117-58).

Broadband Technical Assistance refers to activities that support broadband expansion into rural areas and may include:

- Project planning and community engagement
- Financial sustainability
- Environmental compliance
- Construction planning and engineering
- Accessing federal resources
- Data collection and reporting

The RUS is accepting applications from broadband technical assistance providers, recipients, and entities proposing projects that would support the growth or expansion of a broadband cooperative that would serve rural communities. Applications must be submitted through https://grants.gov by 11:59 PM Eastern on June 20, 2023.

Received \$14 Million to Expand Internet Capabilities

On June 7th Alan Davidson, the head of the Commerce Department's National Telecommunications and Information Administration, visited the San Ildefonso Pueblo, which has plans to

ramp up connectivity with the help of a nearly \$5 million grant.

That's just a small fraction of the hundreds of millions of dollars that could flow into New Mexico in the coming years from federal grants that were included in a massive infrastructure law passed in 2021. New Mexico has also recently announced tens of millions worth of grants to expand broadband from the U.S. Department of Agriculture. Some tribal and pueblo lands are particularly lacking internet services. Several of the federal grants for expanding broadband are geared specifically for Native American communities.

The new Internet for All programs, such as the Broadband Equity, Access, and Deployment (BEAD) and the Connecting Minority Communities (CMC) grant programs, are supporting the development of new workforce opportunities tied to expanding high-speed internet infrastructure across America. The National Telecommunications and Information Administration (NTIA) is

responsible for administering the Internet for All grant programs and recently issued a workforce planning guide for the BEAD Program. BEAD eligible entities and state and territory broadband offices are encouraged by NTIA to collaborate with local partners to develop a workforce that is prepared for the various types of employment opportunities expected for BEAD implementation.

In order to meet the urgency of this moment to connect the unconnected, NTIA will continue to target June 30 as the date by which they will allocate each state and territory's BEAD Program funding for high-speed Internet service. NTIA and the FCC have worked closely with states to assist them in the process of improving

the National Broadband Map to achieve this goal.
