

State Leadership and Cross-sector Collaboration for Expanded Middle Mile Broadband Infrastructure

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The New Mexico Office of Broadband Access and Expansion submitted an application for \$33 million in federal broadband funding and supported several complementary applications from New Mexico broadband providers. Altogether, New Mexico applicants are seeking over \$100 million from the \$1 billion [Enabling Middle Mile Broadband Grant Program](#) to expand critical “middle mile” broadband infrastructure ahead of historic state and federal investments in universal “last mile” access to homes and businesses.

“Middle mile broadband infrastructure is like the interstate highway system of the 21st century,” said Office of Broadband Access and Expansion Director Kelly Schlegel. “It supports connectivity across our state—and around the country. Robust middle mile broadband infrastructure will accelerate our push for universal broadband connectivity and it will help us focus available state and federal funds on building out local networks to homes and businesses. We look forward to working closely with our broadband provider community to identify broadband access and infrastructure gaps, to craft collaborative solutions, and to direct resources efficiently and effectively.”

The Office of Broadband Access and Expansion (OBAE) was active on the middle mile broadband front earlier this year. It issued a request for information (RFI) to take stock of middle mile assets and needs across the state, including among public agencies, private broadband providers, and various other stakeholders. A second RFI was issued to coordinate applications for the Enabling Middle Mile Broadband Grant Program, for which OBAE offered letters of support for applicants—along with the opportunity to forge compelling cross-sector collaborations.

In early October, the National Telecommunications and Information Administration (NTIA) announced that it had received 235 applications seeking over \$5.5 billion in federal grant support—confirming the staggering need for middle mile broadband infrastructure investment nationally. Responses to New Mexico's RFIs confirm our need, as well, for strong investment in robust, redundant, and resilient broadband infrastructure along priority corridors throughout the state.



Timeline for the Enabling Middle Mile Broadband Grant Program

The Enabling Middle Mile Broadband Grant Program complements the Broadband Equity, Access, and Deployment (BEAD) program and the Digital Equity program—all of which were made possible through the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA), otherwise known as the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL).

From the Director's Desk

The New Mexico Office of Broadband Access and Expansion has been working hard to build capacity, review Connect New Mexico Pilot Program applications, and prepare for the arrival of historic federal resources, among other priorities. Part of this preparation includes year-long outreach and engagement toward our broadband and digital equity plans—due to our federal funding partners in Fall 2023.

This preparation also includes perfecting our state-driven approach to broadband mapping.

First, our [New Mexico Broadband Map](#) and [Mapping Review](#) resource continues to benefit from new data and updates; we're asking all New Mexico broadband providers to participate in our data collection and

processing collaboration with the University of New Mexico Earth Data Analysis Center (EDAC). Second, we'll be providing clear guidance to our providers, communities, tribes, and other stakeholders on how best to [challenge federal mapping](#)—including the broadband serviceable location “fabric” and resulting federal broadband access maps.

Connect New Mexico Council Visits Clovis

On October 12, the Connect New Mexico Council held its monthly hybrid meeting at the headquarters of Plateau Communications, located in Clovis. Those council members participating in person had an opportunity to tour the provider's central office and hear first from local residents and other stakeholders interested in sharing their perspectives on broadband and digital equity. This included the state's plans for building capacity to meet its goal of universal access to affordable, reliable, high-performance broadband throughout New Mexico.

The meeting agenda included discussion of the Connect New Mexico Pilot Program, opportunities for tribal outreach and engagement, and updates from each of the Connect New Mexico Council's six working groups: digital equity and inclusion; grants programming; mapping, data, and evaluation; permits, rights-of-way, and pole attachments; regional planning and community engagement; and tribal outreach and programming. Director Schlegel Presents to New Mexico Indian Affairs Committee

Earlier this month Office of Broadband Access and Expansion (OBAE) Director Kelly Schlegel presented to the Legislative interim Indian Affairs Committee at a hearing held at the Santa Fe Indian School. Director Schlegel was asked to provide testimony along with other panelists representing Sacred Wind Communications, the Navajo Nation, and other industry service providers.

Director Schlegel was asked to provide an update on OBAE's priorities as it relates to resources and support for tribal and pueblo communities for enhancing connectivity. There was a productive exchange among committee members and presenters about the role of OBAE for ensuring high standards of service and access to resources as part of the office's primary mission.

Annual Report on Access, Equity, and Data Collection

Meeting its October 1 statutory deadline, the Office of Broadband Access and Expansion (OBAE), in coordination with the Connect New Mexico Council, reported progress toward meeting its statutory obligations per the Broadband Access and Expansion Act ([Senate Bill 93](#)) and the Connect New Mexico Act ([House Bill 10](#)). Just as important, the report noted significant progress toward meeting the broadband moment—the unique confluence of historic state and federal funding opportunities, cross-sector and public interest alignment, and vision for universal access to reliable, affordable, high-speed internet statewide.

The report marked the first in a series of annual updates intended to summarize, on a county-by-county basis, “access to and quality of service of broadband across the state.” The report builds on the 2020 broadband plan—the [*State of New Mexico Broadband Strategic Plan and Rural Broadband Assessment*](#)—and anticipates creation of a State Digital Equity Plan and Five-Year Action Plan as required to leverage the state’s full share of federal broadband and digital equity funding per the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA). Initial federal funding—along with the robust statewide engagement, data collection, and planning it will support—is expected to commence coordinated, year-long activity in October 2022.

Although the State Digital Equity Plan and Five-Year Action Plan will guide future investment of federal funds, these plans will be completed to align with and meet similar statutory requirements and legislative interests established in state law. Much of this work lies ahead, but OBAE knows—that through various data sources—that New Mexico faces significant barriers to universal broadband access and true digital equity:

- An estimated 196,000 New Mexico households lack access to broadband service of at least 100/20 Mbps—the standard federal benchmark for “underserved” and threshold for use of federal funding.
- 26 New Mexico counties are considered to have high or moderate levels of “digital distress”—that is, significant households relying upon mobile broadband and/or lacking access to computing devices.
- Demand among qualifying New Mexico households for the Affordable Connectivity

Program (formerly the Emergency Broadband Benefit) is considerable, with the state consistently ranking among the top three in participation among households with school-aged children seeking monthly subscription assistance (now \$30 per household, \$75 for tribal households).

The report summarizes known measures for broadband access and digital equity including OBAE progress toward digital equity planning and programming; similar progress toward implementation of the state broadband plan; identified obstacles to an integrated system of permits, licenses, and rules for broadband access; recommended statutory, regulatory, and policy changes; and the status of broadband grant programs, including those expanding access, pursuing digital equity, and supporting local planning. - \$3.7 million grant to Continental Divide Electric Cooperative for Cibola and McKinley counties, including Laguna and Acoma pueblos
- \$11.7 million grant/loan to Tularosa Basin Telephone Company for Lincoln and Otero counties, including the Mescalero Apache Nation
- \$14.7 million grant to ENMR Telephone Cooperative/Plateau for Chaves, Colfax, De Baca, Guadalupe, Harding, Lincoln, San Miguel, Socorro, Torrance and Union counties

- \$28.9 million loan to Peñasco Valley Telephone Cooperative for Chaves, Eddy, Lincoln and Otero counties
- \$44.9 million loan to Valley Telephone Cooperative for southwest New Mexico and southeast Arizon
