By nurturing these skills from an early age, the library is fostering a technologically proficient community for the future.

Public libraries throughout the state are also offering vital services to bridge the digital divide. Many libraries, such as the Public Library of Albuquerque and Bernalillo County branches, are hosting computer skills classes, providing residents with the knowledge they need to navigate the digital world. These programs include one-on-one tech support and training in both English and Spanish, catering to the diverse needs of the community.

Furthermore, New Mexico's public libraries have become digital oases for those seeking access to computers and the Internet. From Santa Fe to Alamogordo, libraries are offering free computer access, ensuring that even those without personal devices can harness the power of the internet for education, job applications, and beyond. Some libraries, like the Alamogordo Public Library, are going the extra mile by providing Chromebooks for checkout, allowing patrons to take the digital experience with them wherever they go.
